#### **Opening Agenda**

##### **1. Call meeting to order.**

With a quorum of the Council Members present, the Regular Meeting of the Rockport City Council was called to order by Mayor Jayroe at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, November 14, 2023, in the Training Room of the Rockport Service Center, 2751 State Highway 35 Bypass, Rockport, Texas.

**2. Pledge of Allegiance.**

Council Member Hale led the Pledge of Allegiance to the U.S. flag.

**3. Proclamation: Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Day – November 15, 2023.**

Mayor Pro-Tem Hattman read the Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Day Proclamation.

Mayor Jayroe proclaimed November 15, 2023, at Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Day in Rockport, Texas.

**4. Proclamation: I Love Rockport Center for the Arts Day – December 9, 2023.**

Mayor Pro-Tem Hattman read the I Love Rockport Center for the Arts Day Proclamation.

Mayor Jayroe proclaimed December 9, 2023, as I Love Rockport Center for the Arts Day in Rockport, Texas.

**5. TxDOT Presentation & Proclamation: End The Streak Month – November 2023.**

Danny Cox, TxDOT Maintenance Administrator, gave a presentation on TxDOT's "End The Streak" campaign.

Mayor Pro-Tem Hattman read the End The Streak Month Proclamation.

Mayor Jayroe proclaimed November 2023 as End The Streak Month in Rockport, Texas.

**6. Citizens to be heard.**

At this time, comments limited to three (3) minutes will be taken from the audience from persons who have signed the speaker's card located on the table in the back of the Training Room of the Service Center and delivered to the City Secretary before the meeting begins, or written comments received by 4:00 p.m. on the day of the meeting, on any Agenda item or any subject matter, will be read and summarized in the minutes of the meeting. Persons wishing to address the Council and who have registered using the Citizen Participation Form will have up to three minutes to speak. In accordance with the Open Meetings Act, Council may not discuss or take action on any item that has not been posted on the agenda. While civil public criticism is not prohibited, disorderly conduct or disturbance of the peace as prohibited by law shall be cause for the chair to terminate the offender's time to speak.

There were no citizen comments on items or subject matter that was not on the Agenda.

Mayor Jayroe called for requests to remove any item from the Consent Agenda for separate discussion.

**MOTION:** Council Member Brundrett moved to approve the Consent Agenda Items, as presented. Mayor Pro-Tem Hattman seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

### **Regular Agenda**

12. **Deliberate and act on first reading of an Ordinance partially repealing Ordinance No. 1909 regarding water rates for ratepayers located out of the city; providing for refunds; providing for the validity of said ordinance; repealing all prior Ordinances in conflict herewith; and providing for an effective date.**

Mayor Pro-Tem Hattman read comments from the Citizen Participation Forms received:

- 1) Christina Stinnett, 1508 South Doughty Street: Vote "No" on agenda items 12 through 15.
- 2) Elizabeth Johns, 45 Primrose Circle, Fulton: Vote "No" on agenda items 12 through 15.

Kristie Rutledge, 1411 Dana Drive, addressed the Council and commented: Vote against agenda items 12 through 15; if you correct your mistake, you are invalidating the petition from ratepayers outside of the City Limits asking the Public Utility Commission to review unjustified 47% surcharge.

Council Member Brundrett read comments from the Citizen Participation Forms received:

- 1) Mary Christine Ritter, 1901 Cochran Lane: Vote "No" on agenda items 12 through 15.

- 2) Houston Stern, 10 Primrose Drive, Fulton: Vote “No” on agenda items 12 through 15.

Council Member Hale read comments from the Citizen Participation Forms received:

- 1) Robert Little, 109 South 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Fulton: Vote “No” on agenda items 12 through 15.
- 2) Clyde & V.J. Barre, 114 Timber Lane Loop: Hold to rates already established; stop trying to gouge the citizens of Rockport.
- 3) Mary York, 132 Copano Heights Boulevard: I do not believe we should be charged a surcharge for water because we live outside the City Limits.

Council Member Rangel read comments from the Citizen Participation Forms received:

- 1) Jacob Morgan, 1919 Highway 35 North 665: Don’t let our water rates turn into another City Hall or artificial turf fiasco; keep taxes from becoming theft.
- 2) Candace Sargent, 214 Portia Avenue: Vote “No” on agenda items 12 through 15.

- 1) Doug Webb, 130 Lamar Drive: Due to the sensitive nature of my concerns, I am having my written comments delivered to you tomorrow; Perhaps I could meet with the Mayor and my Ward Council Member or with all Council in Executive Session if permitted; commercial businesses have a great disadvantage from being within the City Limit of Rockport.
- 2) Marlene Oldham, 23 Camellia Circle, Fulton: Vote “No” on agenda items 12 through 15.
- 3) Mary Clare Kane, 38 Primrose Circle, Fulton: Vote “No” on agenda items 12 through 15.
- 4) Kathy Kane, 109 Boardwalk Avenue: Vote “No” on agenda items 12 through 15.
- 5) Patrick Kane, 1123 East Cedar Street: Vote “No” on agenda items 12 through 15; my contact at the Public Utility Commission said Rockport’s rate studies are not rate studies.
- 6) Andrew Kane, 2106 Lakeview Drive: Vote “No” on agenda items 12 through 15; City staff and City Manager is lying to you that the printer did not print the notice correctly – their actions are intended to invalidate the petition.
- 7) Toby Kernan, 1401 Royal Oaks, Fulton: Hope you understand this is not fair and equitable.
- 8) Susie Devereaux, 41 Primrose Circle, Fulton: I oppose what is happening with the water rates.
- 9) Ron Devereaux, 41 Primrose Circle, Fulton: Vote “No” on agenda items 12 through 15.
- 10) Cindy & Bill Mathews, 105 Sandollar Circle, Fulton: Did not wish to speak although she filled out a card to address the Council.
- 11) Julie Kunse, 118 Sandollar Circle, Fulton: Mayor read comment – unfair, unethical and wrong.
- 12) Mary Ciuffo, 60 Begonia Circle, Fulton: Vote “No” on agenda items 12 through 15.

City Manager Vanessa Shrauner stated this Agenda item is to repeal the water rate increase adopted in Ordinance No. 1909 which was effective on September 15, 2023. Ms. Shrauner explained that last week it was brought to her attention that an entire paragraph was omitted from the notification that was sent with the utility bills. Ms. Shrauner said DataPros, the third-party processor for City Utility bills and inserts, stated they will take full responsibility for the error because they had

reformatted the notice and left out a key element of the notification as required by the Public Utility Commission. Ms. Shrauner expressed that once this was pointed out to the City, it is incumbent on us to correct the mistake. Ms. Shrauner added she will be negotiating with DataPros for loss revenue.

**MOTION:** Council Member Rangel moved to postpone Agenda Items 12, 13, 14, and 15, as each state to partially repealing and/or amending rates for Ordinances 1909, 1910, City of Rockport Code of Ordinances 102, Article I and Article II until a public hearing be set per Section 11.05 Regulation of Rates, Subsection 2 of the Charter that states: Upon receiving written request from a utility or public service requesting a change in rates, or upon a recommendation from the City that rates for services provided by or owned by the City be changes, the City Council shall call a public hearing for consideration of the change. Mayor Pro-Tem Hattman seconded the motion.

Ms. Shrauner stated at this point it is about \$43,000 a month to refund to customers, and the longer we go, the more legal fees and more staff fees, and this has to be corrected.

Discussion was held between Council and Ms. Shrauner.

Council Member Brundrett said he had submitted a list of questions to the City Manager, and he asked her to read them and the answers.

Ms. Shrauner read the following:

- 1) Cost to the City for refunding two months of fees: \$86,000
- 2) Is there a rate that we could justify and keep citizens ok without going to PUC: The only rate that would allow for no PUC action would be the pre-September 15th rates.
- 3) 1:1 rate means that citizens of Rockport subsidize out of city users, correct? Yes, for example, a portion of administrative salary is paid from utility fund, but no supplies, training, computers, legal. No Information Technology comes from utilities, no communications comes from utilities, etc.
- 4) Potential cost to out of city rate payers if PUC finds in favor of the City? Is a question that the City Attorney could answer. (NOTE: The City Attorney was attending the meeting via ZOOM and his microphone went out, so the question did not get answered.)
- 5) Potential cost to the Citizens of Rockport if we do nothing and delay to see what happens in 6 months or so in a PUC hearing. \$50 a month to refund? To let this go to a hearing and have the PUC tell us our rate is invalid and must be rescinded because we did not give proper notification, the cost will be not only the refund amount (750,000) but additional legal fees for the PUC to tell us we didn't give notification and we must repeal the rate; it's more like 12-24 months for a hearing.
- 6) Our rates are based on study by whom and when? We are still lower than those suggested rates...? Our rates start from a two-year-old NewGen Study, factor in the last two years inflation and the cost of service.
- 7) Why is the rate outside the City more than inside the City: Part of it is to pay for infrastructure and all of the personnel costs utilized by the utility fund are not captured in the utility funds- such as administration legal fees, supplies, training, etc. non-utility public works and finance. IT and communications also do not receive money from the utility funds.
- 8) Why would we not want to rescind if it is illegal, and the City will still be held accountable

for the error? If I'm not correct will cost City taxpayers even more in the long run from legal fees and refunds with no guarantee? We do want to rescind. There was a mistake at the printer that caused us to not notify the public properly and the risk of continued overcollections is too great and based on legal advice – we need to.

- 9) How much money are we going to lose if we don't rescind? 12-24 months of the PUC process - \$43,000 multiplied by 18 months is about \$750,000, not including appeals plus time and legal fees.
- 10) How much does this impact the budget? Can't answer this at this moment.
- 11) How much money would we lose if we rescind go back to square one and not raise rates and revisit it next year? \$43,000 multiplied by 12 months = \$500,000+.
- 12) What legal ramifications if we don't rescind and move forward as is and what legal ramifications are there if we do rescind? If we do rescind, we are correcting the mistake swiftly and correctly. If we don't, it's the rate, plus court action, plus legal fees.

Council Member Hale stated these are first readings, so we are going to potentially postpone them all until the public hearing on December 12, 2023. Council Member Hale said she did not see all the Agenda items 12 through 15 as the same and if we wait until the public hearing with the second reading, we will be in January to potentially try to rectify this.

Mayor Jayroe called for the vote on the motion:

**FOR MOTION:** Council Member Rangel, Council Member Brundrett and Mayor Pro-Tem Hatman.

**AGAINST MOTION:** Council Member Hale and Mayor Jayroe

Motion carried 3-2.

- 13. Deliberate and act on first reading of an Ordinance amending the City of Rockport Code of Ordinances Chapter 102 "Utilities," Article II. "Water Service." Division 3. "Service Charges" by amending Water Rates for out of City Customers; providing for the validity of said Ordinance; repealing all prior Ordinances in conflict herewith; and providing for an effective date.**

Postponed by vote in Agenda Item 12.

- 14. Deliberate and act on first reading of an Ordinance partially repealing Ordinance No. 1910 regarding Wastewater rates for ratepayers located out of the city; providing for refunds; providing for the validity of said ordinance; repealing all prior Ordinances in conflict herewith; and providing for an effective date.**

Postponed by vote in Agenda Item 12.

- 15. Deliberate and act on first reading of an Ordinance amending the City of Rockport Code of Ordinances Chapter 102 "Utilities," Article III. "Wastewater Service." Division 4. "Service Charges" by amending Water Rates for out of City Customers; providing for the validity of said Ordinance; repealing all prior Ordinances in conflict herewith; and providing for an effective date.**

Postponed by vote in Agenda Item 12.

- 16. Deliberate and act on second and final reading of an Ordinance amending City of Rockport Code of Ordinances Chapter 102, 'Utilities', Article IV. 'Surcharge Revenue Account', by amending Section 102-401 "Surcharge", to increase surcharge fee repealing all ordinances in conflict therewith; providing for severability; and providing an effective date.**

Mr. Sorrell said that upon further research of the Code of Ordinances, it was revealed that the surcharge is not voluntary as originally described and operated as by the City, but mandatory. Mr. Sorrell explained the Council will need to decide whether to maintain as the Code is written or amend the Code.

Brief discussion was held among Council.

**MOTION:** Council Member Hale moved to postpone the second and final reading of an Ordinance amending City of Rockport Code of Ordinances Chapter 102, 'Utilities', Article IV. 'Surcharge Revenue Account', by amending Section 102-401 "Surcharge", to increase surcharge fee repealing all ordinances in conflict therewith; providing for severability; and providing an effective date and changing the Administrative Fee from 5% to 2%, until Council can take action on possible revision to the "mandatory surcharge". Council Member Brundrett seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

- 17. Deliberate and act on second and final reading of an Ordinance amending Rockport Code of Ordinances Chapter 106 entitled "Tree and Landscape Regulations," Article I entitled "In General," Section 106-7, entitled "Tree Preservation and Mitigation Account" and Article II, entitled "Tree Regulations," Section 106-15, entitled "Tree Preservation and Mitigation"; repealing all ordinances to the extent they are in conflict; providing for severability; providing for penalties provided in Section 1-7 of the City's Code of Ordinances; finding and determining that the meeting at which this Ordinance is passed is open to the public as required by law; and providing an effective date.**

Public Works Director Mike Donoho said there had not been any changes in format or content since Council approved the first reading of the Ordinance on October 24, 2023.

**MOTION:** Council Member Brundrett moved to approve the second and final reading of an Ordinance amending Rockport Code of Ordinances Chapter 106 entitled "Tree and Landscape Regulations," Article I entitled "In General," Section 106-7, entitled "Tree Preservation and Mitigation Account" and Article II, entitled "Tree Regulations," Section 106-15, entitled "Tree Preservation and Mitigation"; repealing all ordinances to the extent they are in conflict; providing for severability; providing for penalties provided in Section 1-7 of the City's Code of Ordinances; finding and determining that the meeting at which this Ordinance is passed is open to the public as required by law; and providing an effective date, and with the additional amendment of the minimum height of 14' above public right-of-way. Mayor Pro-Tem Hattman seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

- 18. Deliberate and act on first reading of an Ordinance amending the Official Zoning Map as stipulated under Article 4.1 of the City of Rockport Zoning Ordinance Number 1027 by changing the zoning of land from R-1 (1<sup>st</sup> Single Family Dwelling District) for property located at 1875 State Highway 35 Bypass; also known as Certified Auto Repair, City of Rockport, Aransas County, Texas, to B-1 (General Business District) to comply with current use of property; repealing all ordinances in conflict therewith; providing for severability; and providing an effective date.**

Public Works Director Mike Donoho said the Planning and Zoning Commission recommend approval of the rezoning request.

**MOTION:** Mayor Pro-Tem Hattman moved to approve the first reading of an Ordinance amending the Official Zoning Map as stipulated under Article 4.1 of the City of Rockport Zoning Ordinance Number 1027 by changing the zoning of land from R-1 (1<sup>st</sup> Single Family Dwelling District) for property located at 1875 State Highway 35 Bypass; also known as Certified Auto Repair, City of Rockport, Aransas County, Texas, to B-1 (General Business District) to comply with current use of property; repealing all ordinances in conflict therewith; providing for severability; and providing an effective date. Council Member Rangel seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

- 19. Discussion of traffic study results from previous Council discussion regarding proposal and possible future action regarding the addition of a four-way stop at the intersection(s) in the area around ABC Learning Center.**

Chief of Police Greg Stevens addressed the Council and stated at the August 22, 2023, City Council Meeting a discussion was held regarding complaints to Council Member Brundrett of heavy traffic driving at excessive speeds near the ABC Learning Center. Chief Stevens informed the Council a traffic study over a two-week period was conducted and the results do not support adding four-way stop signs.

Council Member Brundrett thanked the Police Department for gathering the statistics.

- 20. Discussion regarding a Downtown Information Center location.**

City Manager Vanessa Shrauner distributed a handout of a map showing an alternate location for a Downtown Information Center. Ms. Shrauner stated before she came to Rockport, the Council had voted to close Main Street for this information center, but some push-back has been received. Ms. Shrauner explained the area outlined in red is a possible alternative.

Discussion was held between Council and Ms. Shrauner.

Ms. Shrauner said she will look for properties for sale in the area of Austin Street as possible locations for the Downtown Information Center.

- 21. City Manager Report:**  
**A. Projects.**



City Manager Shrauner said she had nothing to report.

## **22. Reports from Council.**

At this time, the City Council will report/update on activities in respective Wards, and all committee assignments, which may include the following: Aransas County Alliance Local Government Corporation; Aransas Pathways Steering Committee; Building and Standards Commission; Coastal Bend Bays and Estuaries Program; Coastal Bend Council of Government; Coastal Bend Mayors Group; Park & Leisure Services Advisory Board; Planning & Zoning Commission; Rockport-Fulton Chamber of Commerce; Aransas County Storm Water Management Advisory Committee; Swimming Pool Operations Advisory Committee; Tourism Development Council; Tree & Landscape Committee; YMCA Development Committee; Texas Maritime Museum, Fulton Mansion, Rockport Center for the Arts, Aransas County, Aransas County Independent School District, Aransas County Navigation District, Town of Fulton, and Texas Municipal League. No formal action can be taken on these items at this time.

Council Member Rangel reported she attended the Downtown Merchants meeting last night.

Council Member Hale reported she had attended the Planning & Zoning Commission meeting. Council Member Hale stated there are now two vacancies on the Planning & Zoning Commission, so Council will need to make progress on filling those vacancies. Council Member Hale said she attended the Stormwater Advisory Committee meeting.

Mayor Pro-Tem Hattman reported the Arbor Day week went well and there were approximately 100-150 people attending. Mayor Pro-Tem Hattman said the Arbor Day in the District event was ruined because it rained.

Mayor Jayroe reported he attended the Stormwater Advisory Committee meeting, and they are looking at reorganizing into a Board of Advisors who are qualified to deal with drainage, stormwater and emergency issues.

At 9:33 p.m., Mayor Jayroe reconvened the Rockport City Council into open session pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 551 of the Texas Government Code.

#### **25. Deliberate and act to reappoint Alternate Municipal Court Judge.**

**MOTION:** Council Member Brundrett moved to reappoint Diane Dupnik as Alternate Municipal Court Judge. Council Member Rangel seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

#### **26. Deliberate and act on *Phong Nguyen et.al. v. City of Rockport Building Standards Commission, Docket No. 23-0151, in the 156<sup>th</sup> Judicial District Court of Aransas County*.**

Council took no action.

Jeff Hutt, 2201 Prairie Road, addressed the Council and said he was speaking for Kim Nguyen. Mr. Hutt said that before the demolition order there had been no code violations. Mr. Hutt asked Council to work with Ms. Nguyen.

Kim Nguyen, 1228 West Terrace Boulevard, addressed the Council and stated she loved the community and loves to live here.

Mayor Jayroe said his understanding is if the Court makes a decision, the City cannot do anything about a Court decision.

City Manager Vanessa Shrauner said Ms. Nguyen should work with her attorney through the Court.
